said that the culture shock was profound. The number of people, the traffic and the different kinds of people was the most telling contrast from what she was used to in Stilwell. There was a black wall in her office that had had a children's art display that was taken down and left, what Danica described as a "black blob." After Danica applied her artistic touch, the wall had been transformed into a pleasant landscape. After 9 years in Detroit, Danica came back home to Stilwell and family without a man. While living in Cherry Tree, she met Mckenzie, the owner of Southern Belles Salon and Boutique when she had

her shop in Cherry Tree. Danica began working as a receptionist. McKenzie found a vacant spot in Stilwell between the Tag Agency and the Laundromat. She moved her business there in August. It is there where, at the prompting of her boss, Danica took to the brush and began her first foray into window art. The results speak for themselves. I asked Danica if she might be entertaining thoughts of making window art, aka, "window splash," a career. She said that would really appeal to her. What is more, she met a master artist in Fort Smith, who has been at it for 30 years. Danica has been invited to shadow her in the near future. That experience may just be a "shadow of things to come." Danica Littledeer, the future "splash queen?"

The first half was pretty much a draw with Ft. Gibson scoring the only touchdown on a

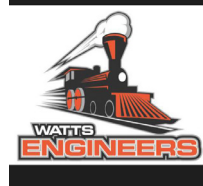

A NEED FOR LOWER TAG FEES

Over the past few days there has been much discussion regarding the governor calling a special session about reducing the taxes that we are required to pay. While Governor Stitt is focused on bringing our state income tax to 0%, I agree that other states that do not have a state income tax gives them an advantage, but there are other things we need to look at as well. I also read that State Representative Justin Humphrey, R-Lane, has filed a bill for the upcoming special session that would remove the 1.25% sales tax on motor vehicle purchases. Humphrey explained that five years ago, during the teacher walkout, legislators raised what was determined at the time to be a fee on the purchase of motor vehicles in order to help pay for a teacher pay raise. While I do applaud the idea of removing the sales tax, our state license fees need to be completely overhauled.

One of the Founding Fathers made the comment that the people of America at the time would rather be equal in slavery than unequal in freedom, how that concept has changed since our founding. I would like to share my own personal experience of the cost when you purchase a new

vehicle. On my farming operation it became necessary for me to purchase a new truck to feed my cattle, my old truck is 17 years old and is starting to require more and more repairs because of its age. I might mention that the new truck is a work truck with no frills and painted the basic white color that most all service trucks are. With inflation the cost of the truck was considerably more than I expected, and many dealers could not even get that type of truck. With the cost inflated that also inflates the insurance cost. On top of all the other expense of getting a much-needed simple farm truck, when you go to the local tag agent to pay all the fees to get a tag on the truck it is like buying it all over again.

The cost to tag the new truck was well over 2,000 dollars. Later I was talking to a friend and told him the cost to tag the truck, this friend happened to be a Cherokee citizen and he told me that if he had purchased the same truck and bought a tribal tag his cost would be 80 dollars. I am not saying that the tribal tags should go up in price, but I do say that the Oklahoma state fees need to be reduced to a more reasonable amount. It is totally absurd for a

non-tribal citizen to pay 30 to 40 times as much to purchase a tag for their auto. Most of the tribes do allocate a portion of their tag fees back to the counties for road projects, most of the poorer counties have become dependent on those funds and it does help provide better roads in those counties. I have often seen stories in the local papers applauding those donations, but it seems to me that those of us who are paying the high tag fees receive little to no appreciation for our donations. In Oklahoma our population is roughly 4 million and not all of us are tribal members, when we all drive on the same roads it is about time that all car tags are more equal.

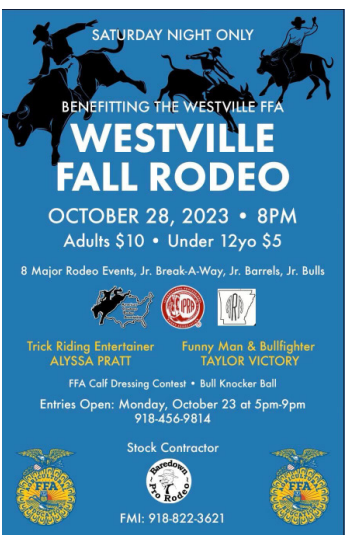
