

Stilwell Indians vs Broken Bow Savages

On Friday, October 27, the 2-6 Stilwell Indians took a 3 hour bus ride south to Broken Bow to tangle with the Broken Bow Savages, who came into this game with a 2-5 record overall and a 2-3 record in District play. Broken Bow still had a shot at qualifying for the playoffs. The Indians had no hope for making the playoffs, but that did not stop them from playing perhaps their best game of the year, albeit in a losing effort. Stilwell went into the locker room at halftime with a 20-19 lead. In the second half, the Savages ground down the Stilwell defense with their big backs' punishing inside running game. The score stayed close but Broken Bow took a 33-26 lead with a little more than 4 minutes remaining. They had the ball, so running out the clock was most likely on their minds. It was on an outside run

from their own 25 yard line that sealed Stilwell's fate. There was a flag on the play around the line of scrimmage which usually indicates an offensive holding call. As a matter of fact, every time the Savages ran outside, there was holding that was never called. At the other end of the play, Stilwell saw a yellow hanky drop to the ground when the runner was tackled with a clean shot. The referee saw something else and called a personal foul, of which there was no evidence. I thought these penalties should have been offsetting. But no, the ref walked off 10 yards for the offensive holding and then reversed his steps and walked off 15 yards against Stilwell. So, instead of 4th down and long, Broken Bow got a first down to keep their drive alive and run down the clock. Another flagrant

atrocity committed by the "home boy ref squad," in my opinion. Still, there were a few milestones achieved by Stilwell in this game. Freshman Brayton Carter eclipsed the receiving yardage record by a Freshman. Another Freshman record fell with Chase Benham marking a new rushing record as well as tackles and sacks. QB Juan Martinez set a school passing record for a Junior. Finally, the 26 points is the most that any Stilwell team has scored at Broken Bow. Broken Bow holds a lopsided 32-2 record in this rivalry's history. The last game of the season will be on Friday, November 3, where the Indians play host to the powerful Poteau Pirates, who are ranked #1 in State, Class 4A. It will be Senior Night, so come on down and wave our hardworking Seniors goodbye. Kickoff is 7 pm.

These days Stilwell and Poteau enjoy a friendly rivalry on the football field. That wasn't the case. Beginning in 1982 until the 90s Poteau's hatred towards Stilwell boiled to the point of the Pirates petitioning to have the Indians banned from ever playing any sport ever again. It all started in 1982. On October 1, 1982 at Bradley Park. Poteau scored a TD with 1:45 left in the game to take the lead. The extra point banged off the goal post however to keep the score 13-10. Stilwell moved to the Pirate 15 yard line but with 25 seconds left in the game a 3rd down pass was intercepted by Poteau. The game seemed to be over with the Pirates QB needing to just take a knee. The snap was mishandled, resulting in what looked like a Rugby Scrum. When everyone was separated, Stilwell Defensive Lineman Brad Rutherford jumped up and ran off the field joyously holding up the ball for everyone to see. Head Coach Pat Martin sent out Senior Kicker Randy Holiman

who sent the game into overtime with a 36 yard Field Goal. Poteau got ball first but fumbled the ball over to the Indians on third down. Martin wasted no time, running Holiman out for a 27 yard Field Goal. The kick split the west uprights and gave Stilwell a 16-13 victory. The game was over but the tempers on the Poteau sidelines were boiling. Poteau coaches were angry about both fumbles and couldn't get the referees attention on the overtime kick were they where pleading to run their Special Teams unit onto the field instead of their defense. The quick field goal attempt had caught Poteau sleeping. On Sunday afternoon Stilwell was notified that the result of the game was being held up for investigation. Poteau claimed that the Referees had been paid off and the ending of the game was rigged. Part of their grievance claimed that Stilwell just grabbed the ball before the center could snap it when the Pirates were set to take a knee. There were a lot of

holes in the Poteau argument however. For example, why not call defensive pass interference to overturn the Pirate interception? The refs could have done many things to make sure Stilwell maintained possession. That would have made the "Stolen Snap" unnecessarily. Plus, what happens if Holiman misses the Field Goal that sent the game to overtime? Why allow Poteau to score with 1:45 left in the game? Later in the week the OS-SAA reviewed the film and found nothing wrong or suspicious. Poteau wasn't finished though. Their Administration contacted all of the NOAA Conference members and asked those schools to Blackball the Indians. The overall goal was to force the OSSAA to tell Stilwell that they were no longer allowed to play any sports at all. That is only the beginning of the story. I will discuss more another time. 5. Not Uplifting: I tripped over my girlfreind's bra; seemed to be a booby trap.



The Hardin Report: Trip To The Border

On September 28 thru September 30, District 86 State Representative David Hardin, along with 20 other Oklahoma State Legislators and 20 or so County Sheriffs took a trip, sponsored by the Federation For American Immigration Reform, (FAIR), to the Texas-Mexico border. All tolled there were 100 participants. There they met with Border Patrol agents as well as Texas Department Of Public Safety personnel to get a first hand look at what these agents are facing in trying to control the massive influx of illegal aliens. Mr. Hardin said that the Department of Homeland Security has tolled that 3.8 million illegals have crossed the border since Joe Biden took office. That number is more realistically double, according to Hardin. He said that the Border Patrol, a Federal agency, has been hamstrung by the Biden Administration in that they are under orders to "catch and release" all except those from Mexico. Those from Mexico are sent back. There are two main Cartels, whom Hardin describes as

well organized criminal enterprises, that run the traffic. The illegals are promised jobs in various parts of the country; in return, they end up paying the Cartels for the rest of their lives. Texas has over 700 miles of border, some of which is walled off, yet there are plenty of places where no wall exists. Illegals gain easy access in the middle of the night. When I asked Hardin if this "invasion" is well orchestrated by the Democrat party for increasing their voter base, he believes that that is the case. One of the things he mentioned is that there are a number of states that are allowing illegals to have a driver's license. Once they obtain that, they are able to vote. He agreed that roughly 90% will vote Democrat. When asked what can be done to solve this problem, he said States will have to get involved since the Federal Government will do nothing about it. He said that he is going to run a Bill which will make illegal entry into Oklahoma a felony. Another Bill would seek to brand the Cartels a terrorist organi-

zation. Still, according to Representative Hardin, without a change of guard at the Federal level, the illegal invasion will continue and get worse. The cost of this invasion to the American taxpayer is enormous. For Oklahoma taxpayers, the cost in 2023 is a hefty \$782.9 million or \$521 annually per household. He concluded with this observation, "There may come a day, when the legal citizen in America will be in the minority."


