There was many an emotional moment on Friday, November 11 on the occasion of Veteran's Day held at the Stilwell High School Fine Arts Center as an estimated crowd of several hundred gathered to honor our resident servicemen and women. Among those in the audience were several of our elected officials: State Senator Blake "Cowboy" Stephens, State Representative David Hardin, State Senator Elect Tom Woods and District 1 Commissioner Elect Charles Boecher. This event was sponsored by the Stilwell High School class of 1966. It all started with a stirring rendition of The Star Spangled Banner sung by the high school band and choir director, Todd Robertson, accompanied by Mary Catherine Waters, Class of 1966, on piano. After the Pledge, Pastor

Charles Crozier gave a spirit filled invocation that ended with all joining in by reciting the Lord's Prayer. More music followed with a medley of classic patriotic songs sung by a harmonious trio made up of Todd Robertson, Rusty Dawson and Randy Buckner. Lisa Langley took the stage and read the moving poem "No...Freedom Isn't Free." Class of 1966 classmate Bill Pemberton, who now lives in Texas, filled the role of emcee and narrator. Stilwell Mayor Jean Ann Wright took the stage to speak about the military service that her sons had given and to read a proclamation which heralded the bravery beyond the call of duty by Stilwell's own Congressional Medal Of Honor recipient Dwight Birdwell and designated that, from this day forward, November 11, in Stilwell, will be

After veterans Captain John Adair and Eric Gregory took the podium, Pemberton finished by reading the hair-raising account of the actions that Spec. 5 Birdwell took on the day that forever wrote him into the American Military history book. Afterwards, the audience sat silently stunned as Dwight Birdwell arose from his seat to give a brief speech of appreciation. A standing ovation was in order. The colors were then taken down. Veterans Day, now Dwight Birdwell Day, in Stilwell will always remind us of Dwight Birdwell's heroism. Thank you to all the veterans who have so courageously served America.

On November 12, at the Stilwell Community Center, a packed house was on hand to take part in Dreamstar Connection's Annual Holiday talent and beauty pageant. Lora Gallardo and her daughter, Rosita Boyce Gallardo, founders of Dreamstar, directed the show. This year saw 67 boys and girls, ranging in age from infant to 12 years old, vie for various honors and prizes while displaying their talents and outfits to an enthusi-

astic audience. One of the most charming contestants was the granddaughter of Donna Dillard Ledford, 3 year old Briella, who took home multiple awards as shown in the accompanying photo. 
