Indians and Lady Indians Basketball Update

After the Girls and Boys teams competed in the Lincoln Christian Winter Classic Tournament, with each team garnering a third place trophy along with All Tournament honors for Snowda Watie and Tyrus Teehee, the two teams got back into league play. On Tuesday, January 9, they took a road trip to take on the Muldrow Bulldogs, in a District game. The Indians came into the contest with an 7-3 record. The Bulldogs, who came in with a 5-5 record, got the best of the Indians, winning by a score of 53-47. The loss left the Indians with an 7-4 season record and 2-2 Distinct. On Friday, January 12, the Indians got back on the winning track when the Sallisaw Black Diamonds came to town. The Indians showed their prowess with Bradon George leading the way with 22 points. With 3 minutes to go in Q3, Stilwell had a one point lead when Hitchens hit a downtown 3 pointer that ignited the Indians to a runaway

It was in the season opener that Roland nipped Stilwell 55-52 on Stilwell's court. The Rangers sport a 13-1 season record. Game time 7:30 pm. For the Lady Indians, the going was a bit easier as they continue to display dogged defense and timely shooting in dismantling the outclassed Lady Bulldogs, 52-39, and the Lady Black Diamonds by a score of 76-33. THE CONSERVATIVE VIEW By Russell Turner HOW MUCH PER MILE

It never ceases to amaze me the ends government will go to relieve us of more of our money. All of us who must drive an auto to go to the grocery store or to operate a business knows the expense to keep that auto on the road. Many times, when I go to the station to fill my cattle feeding truck, it seems like I am making a sizable payment on the national debt. It is a fact that all of us know the more you drive the more it will cost you. We also know that a percentage of the fuel cost includes taxes on each gallon of gas or diesel; it is very simple the more gasoline you purchase the more money you are paying to the government. In 2021 the Oklahoma legislature passed the Oklahoma version of the Road User Charge plan (RUC) – a pilot program and a task force established by House Bill 1712- which is already in motion.

Under this proposed plan, Oklahomans would be monitored on every mile they drive, and pay a tax for each of these miles. This plan would give government more control of our lives, and those of us who live in rural areas would have a bigger burden because of the distances all of us have to travel to operate our businesses and get the supplies we need. Our country was founded upon the idea of government not being involved in all aspects of our lives; sadly, too many of our current politicians can only see dollar signs and are all too ready to come up with another scheme to get more in the public treasury to waste. Fortunately, we Oklahomans have a state legislator who has the ability to understand government overreach and is willing to fight against it.

Rep. Tom Gann, R-Inola, has filed what he called "a pivotal bill aimed at safeguarding Oklahomans' freedom and privacy." "It's

quite inconceivable to me that in the near future, motorists might face variable-rate, per-mile fees for driving beyond a governmentapproved limit," Gann said, highlighting his concerns about the recommendations' potential to put government in charge of every motorist's driven mile. Gann also raised alarm over the suggested requirement for surveillance infrastructure to track mileage. He said he fears this system could be exploited by state and federal authorities for various oppressive purposes, including targeting individuals with differing political views. Gann said the first stage of the Oklahoma version of the Road User Charge plan – a pilot program and a task force established in 2021 by House Bill 1712- is already in motion. He said the next phase - voluntary participation - has been recommended by the task force for legislative consideration in 2025. He said he believes a third phase - mandatory participation – may soon follow. Gann's bill seeks to repeal House Bill 1712, halting any future advancement of this initiative. While Representative Gann is not in my district, I applaud his effort to ensure our freedom and way of life. I urge everyone to contact their Representative and Senator to voice support of his bill. I also believe that we as citizens need to be involved in politics and hold our elected officials to task. House Bill 1712 is just another thing that chips away at our freedom and our right to be left alone by the government.

Lucille Fourkiller Wilson departed this life on January 11, 2024, in Stilwell, Oklahoma. She celebrated her 94th birthday just four days before, surrounded by dozens of friends and family. Lucille was born on January 7, 1930, the daughter of Grant and Mary (Hogner) Fourkiller, in the Chalk Bluff Community where she attended a one-room schoolhouse and lived her entire life. She may have been small in stature but was a giant in her community, leaving an enormous impact and gaining profound respect across generations. A revered Cherokee tribal elder, Lucille was a prayer warrior who loved the Lord. Her Christcentered service was a beacon of inspiration and comfort. Lucille was not only a cherished mother, grandmother, and great grandmother - and she prayed for us all, but also an embodiment of her rich heritage. She understood her role as a keeper of traditions and the Cherokee language, ensuring their continuity for future generations. She taught Cherokee language classes in her home to the New Tribe organization student missionaries. On January 12th, the Cherokee Nation rang a solemn bell to honor the passing of this Native speaker, distinguished by the Cherokee Nation as a National Treasurer. Lucille honored the past while also looking toward the future. She was a pioneering businesswoman whose determination, work ethic, and entrepreneurial spirit led her to be one of the first Cherokee business owners. Lucille and her husband, Andrew Jay Wilson, established Jay's Lunchbox, the first of four successful restaurants they operated for more than 25 years. The restaurants were more than a way to support their family; Lucille and A.J. created places where neighbors and those passing through would find nourishment and friendship - where culture, good conversation, and great food came together over an Indian Taco or a slice of pie. And anyone who tasted her homemade piecrust left with more joy in their hearts. Watching her small hands flutter in a mound of flour to make biscuits or frybread was to witness unrivaled culinary magic. Lucille loved singing Cherokee Hymns. As a member of the Native Praise Choir for 25 years, she traveled the world, sharing blessings of faith and Native heritage to audiences in London, Washington DC, and the Grand Ole Opry, just to name a few notable places she visited. A meaningful highlight was singing in Hawaii and visiting Pearl Harbor in honor of her brother Joe, a Navy Veteran who served in the South Pacific during WWII on an aircraft carrier. Throughout her life, Lucille was active in the Cherokee Baptist Association, Women's Missionary Union, and Sunday School Conventions. She treasured singing, teaching, and cooking for RA/GA and Indian Falls Creek Family Camps. Lucille was a faithful member in many Indian Baptist Churches, including her final membership at Chuculate Baptist Church, and held trusted leadership roles as Treasurer and Secretary. As a Granny at Maryetta Schools for 16 years, children felt her love and the love of God. Well into her eighties, Lucille told her family that she couldn't leave town because she needed to take care of the older people back home. Although Lucille's family

shared her with many, they never doubted that they were most important to her. She gave her love unconditionally - sometimes gentle and sometimes fierce. When one of the grandkids felt down, she reminded them not to forget the trail and ancestors they came from - and to have a cup of coffee which she thought could solve a lot of problems. She and A.J. attended hundreds of basketball, football, baseball, and track events across generations of kids and grandkids. Preceding Lucille in death were her parents; her husband; her children Richard Fourkiller and Trudy Lowry; and her siblings Joe Fourkiller, Anna Ketcher, Betty Hummingbird, Janie Fourkiller, Georgia Glass, and Margaret Fourkiller. Her life was a miracle grounded in faith, service, and resilience. Lucille's legacy lives on through her loving family, including her children Darrell Fourkiller and wife Sue of Eufala, Mary Fourkiller of Stilwell, Terri Fourkiller of Stilwell, Gordon Wilson and wife Linda of Stilwell, Starla Wilson and husband Benton McClelland of Stilwell, and Mark Wilson and wife Alison Anthony of Sand Springs; 27 grandchildren, 59 greatgrandchildren and 4 great-greatgrandchildren. Several nieces, nephews, friends and other relatives will miss her dearly. Whether we knew her as Mom, Grandma, Aunt Lucille, friend, sister - or as A.J. called her, "Go Lucille, Go Go Go" - we carry her love and lessons with us. We honor her remarkable life by living and grieving as she taught us – as a community in faith, unyielding in our dedication to family, our traditions, and love for one another. 
