A Snowda Storm:

Snowda Watie Unleashes An Avalanche Of Points.

Senior Snowda Watie, who recently reached a milestone of 1000 career points, saved her best performance of the year for Senior Night versus the Muldrow Bulldogs on Tuesday, February 6. With a flurry of baskets scored from the top of the key for three, or in the paint with deft floaters, or breathtaking reverse lay-ups along with steals that she took the length of the court in breakneck speed, Snowda's amazing performance buried the Lady Bulldogs in an avalanche, call it the "Snowda Storm". From the very first possession, in which Snowda swished the net from the top of the key for three, one could sense that she was feeling it. In the first half, Watie put up

21 points; however, Muldrow managed to keep the score close with the Lady Indians leading 27-24 at the half. The second half is when the avalanche went into full tilt. The Lady Indians came out with a relentless suffocating stifling full court press that created many a turnover. Snowda was in the thick of things. She found the open shooter time and time again while also adding to her final total of 36 points. The Lady Bulldogs were left panting when time ran out and the scoreboard showed Stilwell 60 Muldrow 47. In my opinion, I have never seen a better High School Girls Basketball player than Snowda Watie. The Lady Indians take their 16-4, 6-2 District record to

a Friday home game with Sallisaw and then travel to Roland on Saturday. Tuesday, February 13 finishes the regular season with a non-conference game at Wagoner.

Coach Nick Davis and his assistant, Matt Leah, are optimistic about the Lady Indians making a deep run into the state playoffs. Keep the "Snowda Storm" coming. Bring home the Gold Ball.



Watts Engineers and Lady Engineers Update

Starting on January 23, the Engineers have run into a rough patch on their season with the only bright spot coming in the game versus Cameron which Watts won 51-46. The next 3 games did not go the Engineers way. On January 26, in a home game with Oaks Mission, Watts was crushed 74-42. Then on January 30, at Cave Springs, the Engineers fell 53-28. Webbers Falls came to town on February 1 and took Watts down by a score of 42-35 leaving the Engineers with a 5-7 season record and 0-4 in District play. Meanwhile, the Lady Engineers during the course of those four games, did not fare any better, losing to Cameron 57-33; Oaks Mission prevailed by a score of 50-32; Cave Springs overwhelmed Watts by a score of 49-7; Webbers Falls also took the Lady Engineers to task by a score of 49-21. 

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
